A Transformational Investment in Environmental Infrastructure



Over \$60 Billion

- Water infrastructure to ensure safe drinking water and clean water
- Environmental cleanup at contaminated brownfields and Superfund sites to return those sites to productive use for the community
- Clean school buses to protect children's health and accelerate the next generation of transportation systems



EPA is implementing these resources with transparency, efficiency and effectiveness to achieve results for the American people.

On November 15, 2021, President Biden signed the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law




The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law provides more than \$50 billion to the US EPA for water infrastructure investments

\$35 BILLION FOR SAFE DRINKING WATER

\$11.7 billion through the Drinking
Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF)
for various drinking water
infrastructure projects

\$15 billion through the DWSRF for lead service line identification and replacement




\$4 billion through the DWSRF for emergency contaminants, including PFAS




The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act A Historic Investment in Water



With Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funding, US EPA, states, Tribes, and localities have a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to strengthen and rebuild America's water infrastructure



This funding provides a historic investment to replace pipes, upgrade water facilities, and ensure that America's water systems are resilient for the future





\$5 billion over 5 years to replace existing school buses

- \$2.5 billion for zero-emission buses
 (e.g., electric buses)
- \$2.5 billion for clean school buses (e.g., electric or low-emission fuel)

Will prioritize low-income, rural, and Tribal school districts Eligible applicants:

- State or local governmental entities
- Contractors that sell buses or arrange financing for sales
- Nonprofit school transportation associations
- Indian Tribes





Chemical Safety and Pollution Prevention





\$100 million to expand the Pollution Prevention program

Significantly increases annual funding and eliminates matching requirement (was 50%)

Helps businesses develop and adopt practices to reduce toxic pollutants, other raw materials, water use and energy while lowering business costs
